Mrs. McDonald co-authored the book, The Steven McDonald Story, with her husband NYPD Detective Steven McDonald. Detective Steven McDonald, who was paralyzed after being shot by a teenage gunman in 1986, passed away on January 10, 2016. "Detective Steve McDonald was the embodiment of a hero," commented Mayor Francis X. Murray. "Through every act and good deed, both before and after he was paralyzed, Steve inspired others to love, respect, and most of all forgive. He will be missed but I know his message will live on."

Over the last 20 years, the Rockville Centre St. Patrick's Parade has become one of the most successful and well-attended parades in New York State. It has become a source of not only cultural pride, but civic pride, as well. The parade is an incorporated not-for-profit organization that annually shares its success with three worthy charities, which are National, Irish, and Rockville Centre focused. Since the parade's inception in 1997, \$1,006,000 has been distributed to 58 individual charities. Rockville Centre's St. Patrick's Parade is "The Parade that Cares and Shares" ®

This year's charities are Backyard Players and Friends, a unique, inclusive arts-based community program dedicated to enhancing the social and interpersonal skills for teens and young adults of all abilities based in Rockville Centre, Breathe Believe, a nonprofit organization founded by Angela Ruggeri and is made up of family, friends

and dedicated businesses to raise funds to provide financial assistance to individuals with cystic fibrosis who cannot afford the essentials to stay alive, and Pieta House, providing free, therapeutic approach to

people who are in suicidal distress and those who engage in self-harm.

Snow Reminders

In the event of a snowstorm, the Village urges residents not go out during or immediately after a snowstorm unless it is necessary. Crews will be able to do their job more quickly and completely if there is less traffic on the roads.

Residents and business owners are reminded that all sidewalks must be cleared within 24 hours after the end of a storm and snow should not be thrown into the roadway when clearing their driveways and sidewalks. If you have a fire hydrant on your property, snow should be cleared so they may be located easily in case of an emergency.

William Rothenberg Honored with Bench Dedication

In honor of Rockville Centre resident Mr. William L. Rothenberg's 103rd birthday, his sons Franklin and Fred donated a bench in his name in at the Village Green.

William L. Rothenberg served for 17 years on the Village Zoning Appeals Board during the 1970s and '80s. He was also chairman for 12 years. During World War II, he was drafted into the Army in 1942, where he served as a JAG officer before he was moved to the Army Air Force Signal Corps. He moved to Rockville Centre in 1953 with his wife Doris, where they raised their two sons, Franklin and Fred. Rothenberg practiced law for 75 years and let his license expire in 2013, when he was 99.

Benches are available to Village residents through the Rockville Centre Conservancy. People can purchase benches for \$2,500, which includes a custom bronze plaque with four lines of text. Money raised from the sale of the benches is used towards a variety of RVC Conservancy projects including, but not limited to, community gardens, street tree inventory and planting and school gardening programs.
